

WHATSHOULDN'T SCARE YOUTHIS FALL

After nearly two months of distance learning, one issue has become glaringly apparent: students are afraid of speaking up.

On a given school day, students have their microphone turned off before they even enter the Google Meet. Any questions posed by the teachers on the attending students are met by an overbearing silence with the occasional notification ding of the chat box. Distance learning means days passing by with just the sound of a teacher's voice and the faint whir of a computer to accompany one's thoughts. It is not a stretch to say, student participation within Google Meets is pathetically low.

For starters, Google Meets are partly to blame for this issue. During a regular day, teachers lead the meeting and lay out future plans for the week. In order to effectively communicate this information, teachers naturally enforce the rule that all microphones must be turned off to limit distractions. For once, teachers can lecture without all of the distractions and side conversations going on in the periphery; instead they can lecture to a supposedly fully attentive group of bright young minds with no interruptions.

However, this approach ends up backfiring in one major way, students are conditioned to be a lot more comfortable with their microphones off than otherwise. When teachers ask a question of the whole class, not surprisingly then, students are hesitant to answer. This goes so far as to a

simple algebraic problem that seems to "stump" a whole Calculus Google Meet since few students bother to turn on their microphone to give the answer.

This development is also due in large part to a combination of social anxiety and complacency on the part of students. It is so much easier to blankly stare at a screen and hide behind the muted microphone than trying to articulate an answer. Also, many students may feel anxiety over speaking in front of the class because it opens themselves up to embarrassment. Students' insecurity in their relationships with teachers and peers can amplify their want to withdraw and shy away from unpredictable social interactions. Either way, through two months of virtual learning, students are overwhelmingly arriving at the same result of not answering even the most basic questions.

Undoubtedly, this silence poses serious problems for the quality of education that students are receiving online.

When microphones are turned off, virtual learning is more similar to a TV show than an actual classroom: students are just watching what's happening on their screen rather than interacting with it. With less socializing, students will feel detached from the rest of their classroom and may start experiencing signs of social isolation. This complete lack of human verbal communication can lead to increased anxiety and poor sleep in an already stressful



time. In addition, the noticeable lack of student voices in the classroom will translate into a poorer education. If students aren't interacting with the teacher and peers, they will be less motivated overall to complete their coursework for a class that they aren't engaged in. When students don't speak up in the classroom, they are the ones who suffer.

To combat this, teachers should look at ways in which they can promote increased interaction between students verbally. Leading a class discussion where anybody can chime in on a nuanced topic would go a long way in helping to promote a sense of community within the student body and provide more engaging lessons. The way things are right now, most Google Meets are an abrupt interruption of a student's studying to relay information that can already be found on Canvas. Making it worth it for the student to actually log into a Google Meet starts with increased student activities such as verbal class discussions that can't be found on Canvas and ends with more synchronous learning overall.

The benefits of having discussions verbally and not just through the Chat Bar are immense. "Class discussions" utilizing the

Chat Bar are, in effect, glorified text exchanges that don't have the same positive mental impact that verbal video discussions have. In this current pandemic where the majority of student interaction is now taking place over various forms of text exchange and email, there should be a greater effort to shift towards verbal communication instead of relying on chat boxes. While class discussions don't fit into every lesson, any opportunity should be taken to engage the students more effectively on video chats.

However, even if the teachers try their best to foster healthy class discussions on Google Meets, these efforts are meaningless if teachers are faced with a sea of muted microphones. I admit, I have been guilty in some classes of taking the easy way out and leaving my microphone turned off. Recently though, I have been focusing on becoming a better participant in Google Meets and I now ask my fellow classmates to follow suit. Next time you find yourself in a Google Meet, mentally prepare to take every opportunity to speak out loud.

The East student body needs to realize that they shouldn't just be a spectator as the school year passes by. Each and every student should want to maximize this situation and not just get through my high school education by doing the bare minimum. Speaking in a Google Meet is not something we should be afraid of this fall.

While the utilization of Google Meets hasn't been optimal, helping to fix virtual learning's drawbacks starts with students making the conscious decision to press Ctrl D.

The results from last issue's virtual learning survey are in.

A healthy majority of respondents indicated that virtual learning is harder compared to in-person conclusions on what should be done to change classes. In addition, a whopping 70% of respondents said "Staying Motivated" was one of the top three hardest aspects of virtual learning: 28% of respondents saying it was the most difficult aspect of online school.


East students were split when it came to Google Meets. While 42.6% of participants said that Google Meets are fine the way they are used now, almost 46% of people said they wanted more asynchronous learning, which would reduce the amount of time spent on Google Meets. Multiple individuals commented that Google Meets should be optional since many sessions don't provide new information and seem like a waste of work time to these students. Approximately 25% of participants said the opposite: more synchronous lessons should be taught through Google Meets. The bottom line is edition of the Courier!

a good majority of students believe Google Meets should be tweaked. However, considering these relatively divided opinions, there can be no clear Google Meets schoolwide. To gain a better picture, teachers could ask individual classes what they would prefer since students might have different preferences based on the type of course.

On the flip side, when students were asked which aspects of virtual learning have been the easiest, there was a general consensus that online test taking has been a breeze with around 42% of respondents listing that option as the easiest aspect. This comes as no surprise since many tests have an open notes policy and a multiple choice format. While tests are usually still timed, they aren't as big a source of stress as they once were. Reducing this stress from test taking is seen by students as one positive adjustment from virtual learning.


BURIAL CHAMBER OPENS UP... WITH NEW MEASURES

It's Halloween Season again, so Burial Chamber is offering a haunted experience. But this year, we're in store for a bunch of changes.

Burial Chamber kicked off its opening for the year on September 25, more than a month before the big day. To hopefully no one's surprise, preventative measures are being taken very seriously. In all four of Burial Chamber houses, any person on the property requires a mask worn over the nose at all times. The staff working will also all wear face coverings, including the characters in the houses. Tickets are not sold after certain times on nights the houses are open. The complex also encourages social distancing and closes one house per night to help guests social distance. The queues also have changed to allow more room for social distancing.

The staff also follows heavy preventative measures. Every night upon arrival, they go through screening of temperature checks and health surveys to ensure not only their safety, but the guests as well.





The houses encourage hand sanitizing and hand washing frequently, and the facility is sanitized and cleaned regularly.

Burial Chamber is a complex built of four attractions, including a new simulator called Trapped, which is quite the experience. The idea is based on a story of trapped miners underground. Your job is to help save the miners who were trapped. Beware, you will get buried alive! Burial Chamber has increased airflow so air doesn't circulate more than one minute in the rooms. The room fills while you're in it, almost like a ball pit, and this year, they use Germ-Block Balls and a sanitation system that cleans them regularly.

Even though 2020 brought some crazy changes, Burial Chamber still offers its original three houses. Ranking them from most to least scary, Phobia would be at the top. Located in the woods, you experience many moments of uncertainty while being jumped out at, in the woods, in the dark... and beware of the man with a chainsaw. The second scariest is Adrenaline, a Industrial/Military under attack of zombies. Adrenaline is more of an old-school haunted house, putting lots of the actors in your mask, and social distance. Don't show fear... face and lots of pop-outs. But you'll also encounter sections that are pitch black, mazes,

people coming out at you from all angles, and a variety of other surprises to get your blood pumping. If you want an adrenaline rush, Adrenaline is the house for you. Insanity is more of a funny (but also scary) adventure where you'll encounter clowns, weird characters, and unsettling settings, like spinning rooms. "It's a blend of fun house meets haunted house," says Burial Chamber Website. Trapped, Burial Chamber's newest addition, provides the buried alive experience (safely) by ball pit balls. Each house takes roughly 20 minutes to go through, and those 20 minutes will be the most exhilarating of your night!

Masks can be purchased at concession stands. Ticket prices start at \$15 for one house, per person, \$25 for two houses, per person, and \$30 for three houses, per person. Tickets start to sell at 6:45 p.m. and stop at 11:45 p.m.

THE CREEPIEST EVENTS IN HALLOWEEN HISTORY

Halloween is upon us, Patriots! It's time to eat all things pumpkin, get sick of pumpkin, and then not eat pumpkin until next fall. This Halloween has already been unlike any other before it. With the rise of COVID-19, this Halloween has already been one for the books. However 2020 is not the first year for odd Halloween occurrences. Let's look back on some of the creepiest events in Halloween history.

Harry Houdini, a native of Appleton, passed away on Halloween in 1926. Houdini was known for his dangerous magic tricks and even had a couple brushes with death because of them. Houdini was in Albany, NY on October 11 for his tour. He was doing his escape trick from a Chinese water tourture cell when part of the equipment broke and fractured his ankle. Against medical advice, Houdini continued his tour, which included a lecture at McGill University. Houdini met with a couple university students that day. A student named J. Gordon Whitehead asked Houdini if it was true that he could resist any brutal punch to the stomach. Houdini confirmed this fact. Without warning, Whitehead punched Houdini hard in the stomach three or four times. This was a large problem because Houdini did not have time to prepare for the punches, but also because he was in a reclined position on a couch because

of his ankle. Houdini experienced a good deal of pain from the hits and still had stomach cramps later that night. The next day he woke up in worse pain, but he still continued his tour and got on a train to Detroit. He then developed cold sweats and a 104 degree fever. A doctor diagnosed him with appendicitis and urged him to go to the hospital. Houdini being ever so stubborn, refused to get medical assistance again. Houdini struggled through his show and eventually collapsed after ending the show early. He was then rushed to the hospital where he had an emergency appendectomy. The doctors believed that his appendix had ruptured days before his appendectomy. He did not recover from his surgery and ended up dying on Halloween. His death is considered accidental, but many have their own theory. It is unlikely that the blows to his abdomen were the cause of his appendix rupturing, so J. Gordon Whitehead did not face charges for Houdini's death. Some also believe that because Houdini was such a skeptic the spirits were the cause of his death because of his meddling. Houdini's wife Bess tried to contact Houdini from beyond the grave every Halloween for the next ten years. She eventually gave up, but many continue to try and contact Houdingevery Halloween.

You might be wondering if anything unearthly has happened in recent Halloween history.

The answer is yes. If you're a junior or senior you might have even been alive for this event. It was in 2003 when the Halloween solar

Three large sunspot groups appeared. Sunspot groups are groups of dark spots on the Sun with a slightly cooler temperature than the rest of the sun. The largest of these spots was thirteen times the size of the Earth. These spots caused seventeen solar flares. A solar flare causes the Sun's magnetic fields to stretch and then snap. On October 28 the largest sunspot ejected the largest solar flare recorded at the time directly towards Earth. A cornal mass ejection followed. A cornal mass ejection is when there are enormous explosions on the Sun's surface that blast billions of tons of electrified gas and subatomic particles into space at up to five million miles per hour. After the cornal mass ejection a geomagnetic storm followed. Twenty four hours later another cornal mass ejection followed by a geomagnetic storm occurred. After all of those big fancy space science words you are probably wondering how the Earth is still intact and we're all not dead. The Earth's atmosphere is the hero of this story. Nothing hit Earth's surface, but the storms did damage Earth's satellites. The satellite issues caused GPS and radio communication problems along with many other things. If these storms happened nowadays that damage might look very different. In 2003 the internet was still relatively new. And if you can remember back that far, smart phones didn't exist. The solar storms did have major other effects though. Japan lost an entire scientific satellite, and the Martian Radiation **Environment Experiment on NASA's Mars** Odyssey Mission was cancelled. Astronauts in the International Space Station even had to take cover because of the high radiation levels. Airline flights from North America to Asia, specifically over the North Pole, had communication problems and had to be cancelled. Antarctic scientists lost power for a hundred and thirty hours.

Nothing sets the scene for an hour as well. Luckily none of the damage was too extensive. There were positives for this storm. The storm let off an amazing ray of northern lights also known as aurora borealis. The most amazing thing about this case of aurora borealis was that they were seen extremely South. Sightings were seen as far South as central Europe, the Medditerainian, Australia, California, Texas, and Florida. The solar storms of 2003 lasted from October 9 to November 7. Nothing sets the scene for a uncanny Halloween better than a eerie sky.



The most famous spooky event is the War of Worlds radio broadcast of 1938. Orson Welles had rewritten H.G. Wells sci-fi novel The War of Worlds into a radio script. On October 30 1938, in New York, the broadcast went out to millions of Americans. The broadcast consisted of a spoken introduction followed by a weather report and orchestra music. Nothing out of the usual, right? Well don't worry, the chaos ensued after. The music was interrupted by an announcement that there was an explosion on Mars. The music continued again. It was nothing to panic about; Mars was far away after all. Then there was an announcement that a meteor hit a farmer's field in Grover Mills, New Jersey. It was said that a martian came out of the large metallic cylinder. The martian was followed by many more of its kind. They were described as being as large as a bear, having tentacles, having black eyes and a v-shaped mouth, and looking like a gray snake. The martians then fired "heat-ray" weapons and even took down the seven thousand National Guards that had been deployed. After being attacked by artillery, the martians released poisonous gas. The same meteors filled with martians were then announced to have landed in Chicago and St. Louis.

He went from a nobody to a celebrity overnight. This very radio broadcast led him into his Hollywood fame where he then starred in and directed the classic film *Citizen Kane*. Welles' broadcast struck fear in a lot of people, but hey, he ended up winning an Academy Award!

Halloween has been a tradition in The United States since the early 1900s, when Irish and Scotish immigrants brought over the holiday. At the beginning, Halloween was only celebrated through decorations and cards, but towards the 1950s costumes and trick or treating became commercialized. Although the holiday did not originate in America, the United States plays a big role in the celebration of Halloween. This holiday has since become known for dressing up in creative costumes and going to neighbors' houses for candy in America, but Halloween is not always celebrated

in the same way across the world.

Mexico

Latin American countries, such as Mexico, celebrate Dia de los Muertos (The Day of the Dead). This holiday begins on October 31 and concludes on November 2 with All Souls Day. During this three-day celebration, altars are decorated with flowers, candy, photographs, food, and drinks to honor their deceased loved ones. It is believed that during this celebration their loved ones return home and visit their family. Another tradition of Dia de los Muertos is the sugar skull. These skulls are an offering to the god Mictlantecuhtli, who is believed to grant them a safe journey to the underworld. On the last day of celebration, relatives will gather by the grave sites to host a picnic and say goodbye to their deceased loved ones.



<u>Ireland</u>

Halloween originated in Ireland, and some traditions created by the Celts are still carried on today. Children continue to dress up in costumes and go trick or treating while adults participate in parties or large bonfires in the countryside. Multiple games are played throughout the night, such as bobbing for apples or miniature treasure hunts. An infamous card game played on Halloween is where a child chooses a certain card displayed, and wins whatever prize found underneath it. These prizes mostly consist of coins, candy, or pastries. Barnbrack is a fruitcake that is eaten on Halloween that holds a "muslin-wrapped treat" inside. Whatever is found inside is told to tell your



future. If a ring is found, the person will be married soon, but if a piece of straw is found the person will have a good harvest that year. As for the "trick" part of the night, children play "knock-a-dolly," similar to the American "ding-dong ditch," where they knock on a neighbor's door and run away before it is opened.



China

Similar to Latin American countries, China also celebrates Halloween by honoring their ancestors. This festival is called Teng Chien, where they place offerings in front of photographs of ancestors and relatives. To guide the spirits from the dead, they light bonfires and lanterns throughout the night.



Another celebration in China is the "Feast of the Hungry Ghosts." The "hungry ghosts" are said to be the spirits of those who died unnatural deaths or those whose family line has died out, that are looking for affection or recognition. These spirits are also offered food and drinks in hopes to make them feel welcomed.

<u>Israel</u>

In almost all Middle Eastern countries, Halloween is not officially celebrated. Instead in the larger cities of Israel, clubs and bars will host special parties on October 31st for those that wish to dress up. Children usually do not celebrate anything on Halloween, but they do participate in a similar holiday earlier in the year. This Jewish holiday is called Pruim and takes place on the 14th day of Adar (which is usually in March). Although they still dress up and go door to door, they do not ask for candy. Instead they go to visit the elderly and ill people in their neighborhood to give food and drinks. The children that participate in this tradition collect money throughout the year to afford their costume as well as the gifts they are giving others.
