FLEX program is a highly competitive program funded by U.S. Department of State. It operates in Georgia, Armenia, Azerbaijan, the Czech Republic, Estonia, Greece, Hungary, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Latvia, Lithuania, Moldova, Mongolia, Montenegro, Mongolia, Poland, Romania, Serbia, Slovakia, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, Ukraine, and Uzbekistan. Students complete in multiple rounds of testing to earn a scholarship, which provides them one academic year in the United States with a volunteer host family. It's about learning American society and values, living the American lifestyle, and exchanging cultures.

I've got a marvelous news for you! Until 2022, FLEX program only sent high school students in the USA, but now, American students can also go to Georgia, Kazakhstan and Poland. Discovering new culture and experiencing new things changes you. Take part in this program. Don't miss a chance to improve your skills and make your life more interesting. Why do we celebrate Hispanic Heritage Month?

Hispanic Heritage Month celebrates the importance of Hispanic or Latinx heritage. Hispanic Heritage Month honors Hispanic and Latinx members of our communities and Hispanic/Latinx who have impacted society.

Selena Quintanilla (4/16/71-3/31/95) was a Mexican-American singer/songwriter who blurred the lines between "Too white for Mexican and too Mexican for white." Selena was known for her Tejano-style music, although she struggled to learn the Spanish language for most of her life. Selena brought so much attention and media representation of the Latinx culture. Even today, you see people in our school wearing Selena T-shirts or listening to her music. Selena brought awareness to the "Not American enough, not Mexican enough" standard and helped many people to understand that being Mexican American is an amazing thing to be. Unfortunately, Selena was killed early in her career, but her music still mean as much today as it did 25 years ago.

Another influential person in the Hispanic/Latinx community who is still extremely relevant today is **Jennifer Lopez** (7/24/69-), also known as J-Lo and Jenny from the block. She has represented Puerto-Rican culture and completely altered the amount of Latino representation in the media. Fun fact: J-Lo actually played as Selena in the movie "Selena" (which is a beautiful movie, and if you have not watched it, add it to your list!). J-Lo has mainstreamed not only Puerto-Rican culture, but also paved the way for many other Hispanic/Latinx cultures to be acknowledged. J-Lo made these opportunities for Hispanic/Latinx people in general, but most importantly, J-Lo mainstreamed Hispanic/Latinx women. J-Lo is truly a powerful, influential Latina. influential Latina woman is Ellen Ochoa (5/10/58-), the first Hispanic woman to go to space! Ellen was LA Born, raised by her Mexican parents. She studied at San Diego State University for her first physics degree and later, studied for her masters as well as her doctorates at Stanford. Ellen was noticed by NASA for her impeccable research in 1991, and by July of that year, Ellen was an astronaut. Not only is Ellen the first Hispanic woman to go to space, she is also the first Hispanic person in general to be the director of the Johnson Space Center (2013). Ellen is making marks not only for Hispanic individuals, but she is also making marks for all women in STEM. Ellen is now retired after 30 years of service. She is a successful and very intelligent Hispanic woman. She has made a difference for many people.

Library Advisory Club


